The most beautiful thing in the world is a child's smile. The next best thing? "Knowing that you are the reason behind it"

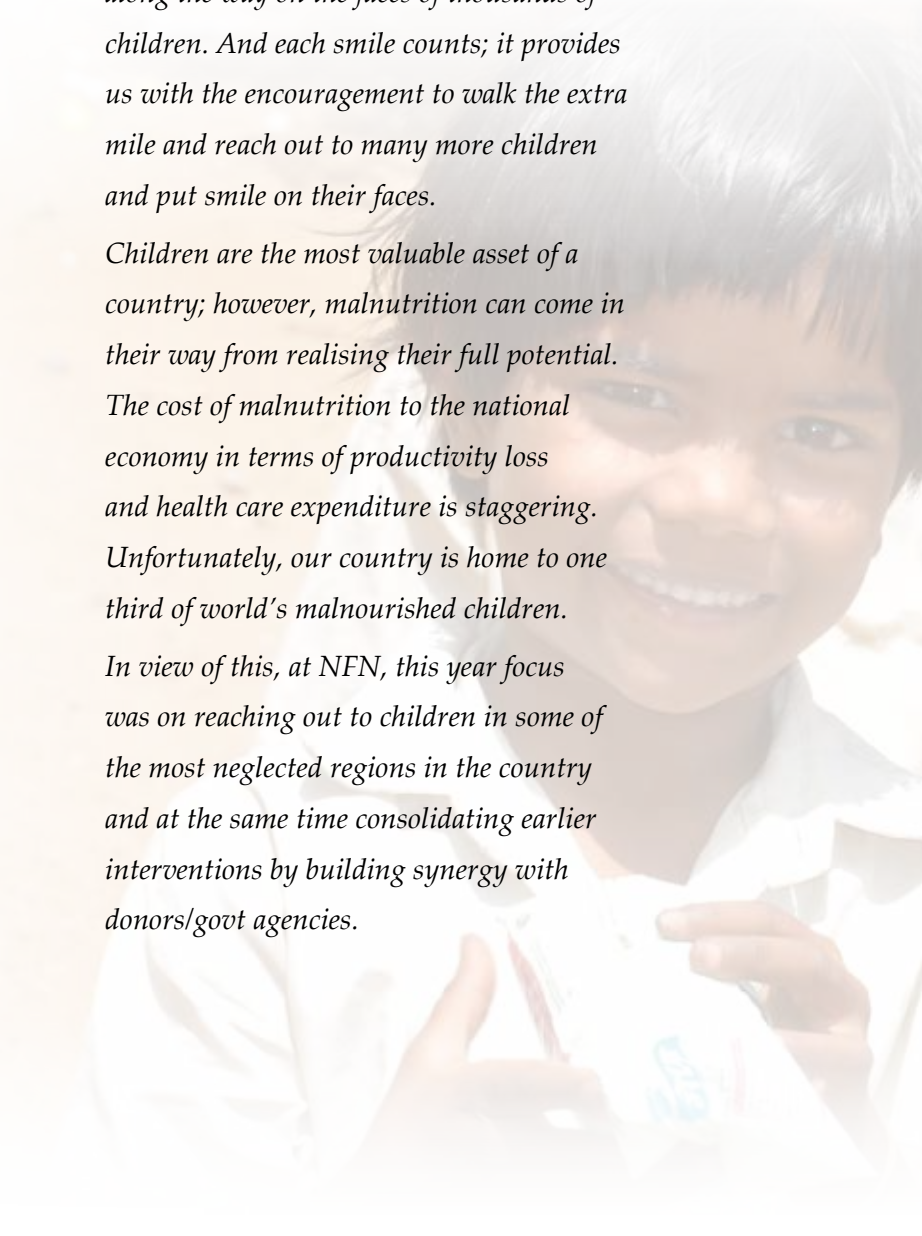
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As NDDDB Foundation for Nutrition (NFN) bids farewell to another year of successful interventions aimed at enhancing nutritional profile of the children, what we recall is the ecstatic smiles we have generated along the way on the faces of thousands of children. And each smile counts; it provides us with the encouragement to walk the extra mile and reach out to many more children and put smile on their faces.

Children are the most valuable asset of a country; however, malnutrition can come in their way from realising their full potential. The cost of malnutrition to the national economy in terms of productivity loss and health care expenditure is staggering. Unfortunately, our country is home to one third of world's malnourished children.

In view of this, at NFN, this year focus was on reaching out to children in some of the most neglected regions in the country and at the same time consolidating earlier interventions by building synergy with donors/govt agencies.



Undeterred by remoteness of the location, NFN this year reached out to schools in Gadchiroli an aspirational district in Maharashtra and ensured supply of 200 ml per day per child fortified flavoured pasteurised toned milk. All groundwork for initiating milk supply to school children in Malkangiri, an aspirational district of Odisha has been completed and it will be initiated soon. Our existing donors continue to repose faith in us by renewing and expanding the existing programmes.

In the current situation of the COVID-19 pandemic, importance of nutrition grows manifold. It has been widely reported that milk has significant and beneficial effect on immune response of the body. Therefore, inclusion of milk in the food/nutrition delivery programmes of the governments through Public Distribution System (PDS), Mid-day Meal scheme (MDM), Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) etc. should become part of our long-term strategy to meet the challenges posed by COVID-19. Adding milk to food basket will have the twin benefit of securing the health of our children and also ensure livelihoods of our dairy farmers.

I urge all stakeholders, the government, civil society and corporates through their CSR funding to come forward and partner with us.

I thank all the donor partners who have associated with NFN in its pursuit to address malnutrition. NFN will continue to remain committed to improve our children's lives in a meaningful way. I am sure that with our combined efforts, we will be able to gift a better tomorrow to our children and contribute towards building the nation of our dreams.

Let us all come together to build a stronger, healthier and prosperous nation.

NDDB Foundation for Nutrition's core objective

To provide nutritional support to government school children through supply of nutritious products by a network of milk producer organisations (dairy cooperatives and producer companies) to help reduce malnutrition.

Year in retrospect

During the FY 2019-20, NDDB Foundation for Nutrition (NFN) continued to make steady progress towards achieving its vision of reducing malnutrition prevalent in the country.

This year was particularly characterised by interventions in some of the most neglected regions in the country and at the same time consolidation of earlier interventions by building synergy/ renewed partnerships with govt agencies/donors was also undertaken.

In line with NITI Aayog's emphasis on aspirational districts to get poor people, especially younger children, free of hunger, NFN made conscious efforts to spread the coverage of Giftmilk initiative in such districts.

NFN collaborated with Central Public Sector Enterprises like NBCC India Limited (NBCC) and NBCC Services Limited (NSL) for CSR implementation of Giftmilk programme for around 4,000 children in Gadchiroli, an aspirational district in Maharashtra. The programme was launched on 28th February 2020. Local dairy cooperative, Bhandara Milk Union has been entrusted with the task of supplying of 200 ml of fortified flavoured pasteurised toned milk to the children studying in 26 government schools across the district.

NFN also conducted several events and rallies to bring awareness among people and importantly school students about importance of nutrition and milk's role in providing those.

Another milestone in NFN's journey was renewed partnership with REC Foundation for its CSR allocation which signifies continued trust of donors in NFN's interventions. An agreement was signed to initiate Giftmilk programme for 15,000 students each in Gajapati district of Odisha and Muzaffarpur district of Bihar. The aspirational districts have been identified on the basis of their nutritional status. Further, NFN forged partnership with IRCON International Limited (IRCON) for distribution of Giftmilk to 3,000 students under their CSR assistance in Malkangiri, an aspirational district of Odisha.

NFN also expanded its operations by adding another 1,000 students in Ooty (Tamil Nadu), 1,000 students in Anand (Gujarat) and 2,000 students in Nagpur (Maharashtra) under the CSR assistance of NDDDB subsidiaries.

Ensuring transparency and accountability

NFN's commitment to transparency and accountability has been further strengthened by its initiative to appoint supervisors for the programme operational in Nagpur and Gadchiroli in Maharashtra. This measure shall increase efficacy of the programme implementation through constant monitoring and guidance to the schools and milk unions supplying milk. The supervisor shall work in close contact with the students, teachers, parents as well as the local community providing a true picture of the benefits and short comings of the programme.

Moreover, during the year, NFN distributed monthly Giftmilk report

booklets among the schools to maintain the records of consumption vis-à-vis receipt and attendance. NFN also provided assistance for regular data sharing by the schools and the milk unions supplying milk. NFN's audio-visual film on 'Benefits of regular milk consumption by children' was also regularly screened at all programme schools to highlight the importance of daily milk intake for overall development of the children.





Stakeholders' involvement initiatives

NFN believes that for maintaining its growth momentum, it is important to constantly innovate and increase involvement of the beneficiaries. Keeping this in mind, NFN focussed on organising nutrition awareness events in government schools. Celebration of National Nutrition month i.e. November 2019 was one such initiative. As part of the celebration, one week awareness drive was organised. A display vehicle providing information on importance of balanced diet and necessity of inclusion of milk in diet was sent to schools in and around Anand for nutrition awareness. The drive also encompassed distribution of flavoured fortified toned milk to the children. The successful implementation of the awareness drive and public appreciation led to the replication of the programme by dairy cooperatives in different states.

Similarly, World School Milk Day celebration on 25th September, 2019 was yet another effort to tap the energies of the children into act of brainstorming and expression. Competitions like quiz/drawing/essay and talks on benefits of milk were conducted in programme schools in Anand, Bokaro, Nagpur and Hyderabad.



Chairman, NFN has authored two articles namely "How milk can address malnutrition in children" and "Addressing malnutrition through school milk programme" which were published in Financial Express and Free Press Journal respectively to propagate the idea of school milk programme for its larger acceptance. The Chairman stressed on impressing upon the central government to consider announcing a policy and a centrally sponsored scheme with a fund sharing system between Centre and state governments to initiate school milk programmes on a countrywide basis on Giftmilk model. This will have the twin advantage of improving child nutrition on one hand and providing market/livelihood support to the dairy farmers of the country, majority of whom are small/marginal and landless, on the other hand.

Developing alliances

With an intention to promote milk consumption among the children and develop future alliances, NFN joined hands with SAIL for their Foundation Day celebration. 'Giftmilk' pouches of 200 ml were distributed on this occasion to around 7,300 children on 24th January, 2020 through Jharkhand State Co-operative Milk Producer's Federation Limited and Chhattisgarh State Cooperative Dairy Federation at 6 SAIL Steel Plants locations in Jharkhand, Odisha, Chhattisgarh and West Bengal.

Last year also witnessed shaping up of NFN – TATA Trusts partnership for resource mobilisation and increasing the outreach of NFN's activities. Visibility was identified as one of the crucial areas to work upon so as to provide a momentum to NFN's mission of reaching out to more children at the last mile and bring a change in their lives. Therefore, both organisations worked together in development of communication material for an impactful presentation of objectives and activities.

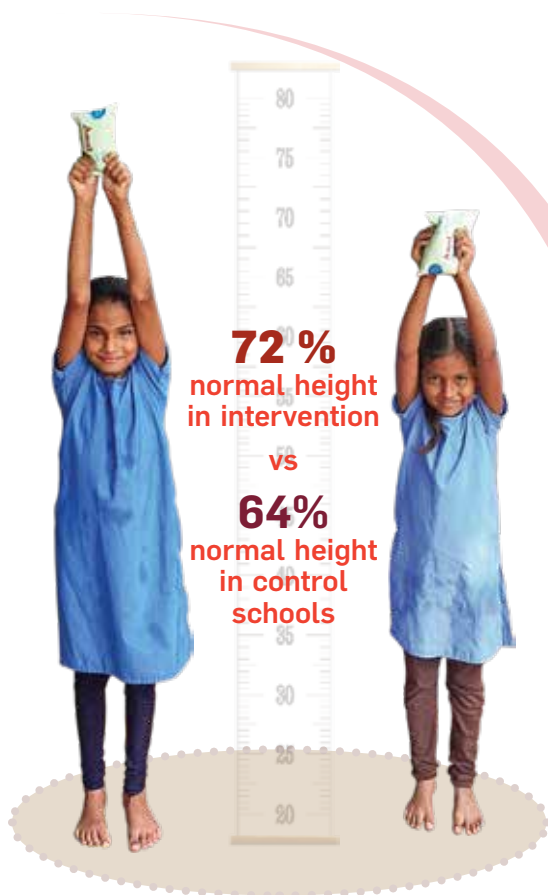
Further, in a conference on 'Transformation of Aspirational Districts- CSR Initiatives by CPSEs' organised on 3rd March, 2020 by Department of Public Enterprises under the Ministry of Heavy Industries and Public Enterprises, NFN and TATA Trusts showcased best institutional practices in addressing malnutrition. The workshop provided an opportunity to communicate the essence of NFN's vision to various stakeholders in government/private sectors.



Studies

NFN has always advocated distribution of milk on long term basis under its programme to provide maximum benefits associated with continuous milk consumption to the children. In order to demonstrate the significance of continued distribution of Giftmilk, an impact

study was funded by NFN through Rajendra Institute of Medical Sciences, Ranchi after two years of distribution of Giftmilk to the children in Latehar, Jharkhand. The study findings showed persistent decrease in stunting levels and improvement in attendance in programme schools thus establishing the sustained benefits of continuous consumption of milk by children.

Apart from CSR implementations, NFN facilitated distribution of flavoured milk in Tetra packs through MDFVPL at Odisha's Fani Cyclone affected districts of Puri, Cuttack and Khurda in April 2019. The milk was distributed under ₹2 crore grant provided by NDDB for providing relief support to Odisha.

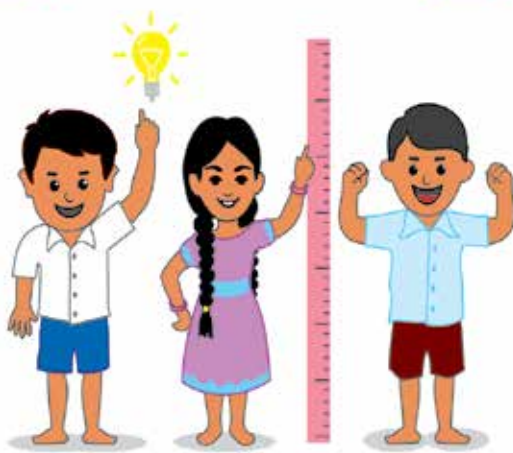
Progress

During the year, NFN received donations of about ₹279 lakh. It spent ₹264 lakh, of which 98% was spent on account of supplying milk to school children. NFN covered around 25,000 students of 92 government schools in six states namely, Delhi, Gujarat, Jharkhand, Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu and Telangana in association with its donor partners India Trade Promotion Organisation (ITPO), Bokaro Power Supply Company Limited (BPSCL) and NDDB subsidiaries MDFVPL, IDMC and IIL. Out of

these, 52% are girl students and 40% are from SC-ST category. NFN served around 23 lakh Child Milk Days (CMD) throughout the year. CMD means one child getting a glass of milk for a day.

In addition, considering the success of the Giftmilk programme in Latehar, Government of Jharkhand adopted and expanded the programme to cover around 28,000 children of Latehar, Ranchi and Hazaribagh districts. Around 32 lakh Giftmilk units have been distributed throughout the year under the government funding.

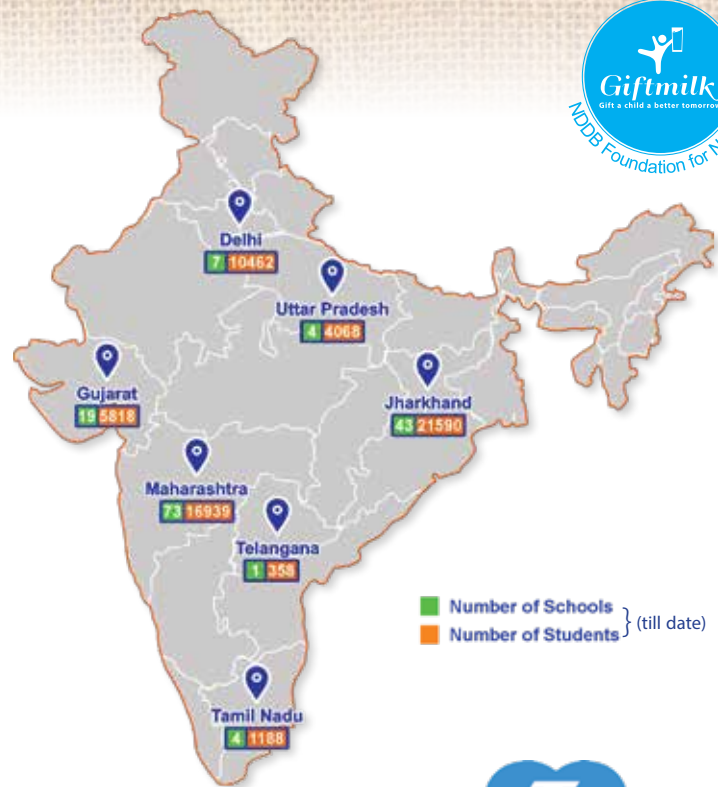

The Story of Mahenurbanu



Mahenurbanu, a student of fifth standard of Prathmik Kanya Shala (PKS), Anklav in Gujarat's Anand district, was never fond of milk. When she was told they will be provided milk in school, she said no. Little Mahenurbanu's opinion quickly changed when she tasted the fortified flavoured milk being provided under the Giftmilk programme of NDDB Foundation for Nutrition with CSR assistance from IDMC Limited. Since November, 2017, Mahenurbanu and 400 students of the school have their glass of milk after assembly on every working day.

"*mane bahu game che!* (I like it a lot!). I wait for my turn every day to enjoy my milk pouch," says Mahenurbanu.

Way ahead

NFN is planning to launch Shishu Sanjeevani as a pilot project for Aanganwadi children in the upcoming financial year. The pilot project will also consist of an impact study to establish the benefits of Shishu Sanjeevani on the health of the children.

NFN also plans to venture into implementation of a pilot project on 'GoGreen' programme to improve nutrition through addressing soil health and global warming. The programme intends to enhance nutritional quotient of the soil by manure management and at the same time attain environmental benefits by mitigating contribution of dairying in global climate change through limiting the Green House Gas (GHG) emissions from manure.

The Giftmilk programme will continue to be implemented with CSR assistance of NDDB subsidiaries (MDFVPL, IDMC & IIL), BPSCL,

NBCC, NSL, REC Foundation, IRCON in Bihar, Gujarat, Jharkhand, Maharashtra, Odisha, Tamil Nadu and Telangana. With this, NFN proposes to serve around 30 lakh child milk days during the next year by covering around 30 thousand children.

Further, considering the present crisis of Covid 19 pandemic, NFN shall make efforts to increase the awareness on importance of nutrition, specifically milk to improve immunity. NFN shall also strive to collaborate with PSUs and other organisations to provide a trusted platform for their CSR implementation and at the same time realise its mission to address malnutrition through distribution of 'Giftmilk' and 'Shishu Sanjeevani'.

Thus, NFN through its varied initiatives will continue its pursuit of addressing nutritional disparity in the country and benefitting our future generation.

The Story of Giftmilk in ZPHS, Laxmapur



During physical exercise sessions, tired and dizzy students had been a common sight for the teachers of the Zilla Parishad High School, in Laxmapur village of Telangana's Medchal district, said P V K Nagalakshmi, its Physical Education Teacher. My colleagues told me, as most of the students attended school empty stomach, it affected their concentration-level, she said.

However, there is a noticeable difference now after the NDDB Foundation for Nutrition started providing fortified flavoured milk to the students under its Giftmilk programme since February 2016. The milk is being distributed through the CSR assistance of Indian Immunologicals Limited and is supplied by the Nalgonda- Ranga Reddy Milk Producers Mutually Aided Cooperative Union Limited, Hyderabad.

The concentration level of the students have improved significantly and instances of feeling giddy after physical exercise have went down too, the teacher said.

Also, there has been a steady improvement in the enrolment in the school following the launch of Giftmilk programme under which about 58,000 units of milk has been provided to 303 children in the academic year 2019-20.

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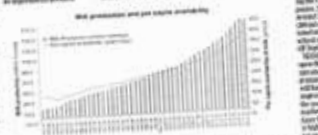

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion


